Discussion included:

- G. Malek expressed concern about the future land use map being used as defacto zoning. He will vote "no"
- T. Ruth noted the previous plan amendments required by the State were to bring the plan into conformance with Vermont law.
- R. Krauth agreed that the map needs to be there, and agreed that the map could be used as defacto zoning. Krauth noted the map appeared to depict the current land use, not what is suggested to be there. He noted the Commissioners' job is to apply the map as information, not as zoning.
- S. Lotspeich said Vermont does not have regional zoning so the previous statements were not accurate statements. Zoning is enabled at the local level only. Regional plans are a basis for commentary in Act 250 and both local and regional perspectives are considered. The recent push is for local and regional plans to be specific.
- P. Rose asked if the map title could be changed to "recommended future land use." B. Waninger noted it could. The Commission would need to restart the public hearing process.
- G. Malek asked what the process is for a Regional Plan being declared invalid without the Council of Regional Commissioners. Waninger noted the process would be a court challenge. Malek noted Commissioners had not expressed concerns about the lack of a map in the past.

CLEAN WATER FUND

- 29 Kari Dolan described her role as the Vermont Clean Water Initiative Program Manager. The Clean Water
- 30 Fund provides additional state funds above current allocation levels to complement, enhance, and
- 31 leverage existing resources. The use of the fund is to maximize opportunities for the restoration and
- 32 protection of Vermont's waterways by prioritizing and targeting resources. To maximize the
- 33 effectiveness of this fund, the fund should strengthen and complement existing state assistance programs
- 34 (e.g. grant and loan pass-through programs), wherever possible. Water quality issues are a result of
- 35 runoff in Vermont.

- The Clean Water Fund has a board made up of five members with Secretaries from the Agencies of Agriculture, Transportation, Administration, Natural Resources, and Commerce and Community
- 39 Development.

40

- The Clean Water Fund current allocation is \$4-5 million for FY17, which is allocated in blocks to the
- 42 agencies for dispersal through existing grant programs. It is supported by property transfer tax fees. This
- 43 financing mechanism expires in FY18. The Vermont Treasurer's Office is leading an effort to identify a
- 44 permanent financing structure.

2 Dolan noted the vision of the Clean Water Fund is to provide technical and financial support to affected 3 sectors. She described how the fund works by providing examples. There is a public comment period in 4 progress. Dolan asked that Commissioners and communities visit the Agency's website and voice their 5 thoughts through the online survey.

L. Hebert recommended the Clean Water Board consider using block grants to towns to reduce the administrative burden of writing, reviewing, and administering grants.

- Governor's Blue Ribbon Commission on Financing Childcare is holding community forums all over the 21
- state; July 25th, 7:30 pm in Barre is the one for Central Vermont. Waninger also noted that Building 22
- 23 Bright Futures has requested RPC assistance for work with towns on childcare. Waninger will report

24 back as the request is refined.

REGIONAL PARTNERS REPORT

- 27 CVEDC – J. Stewart described CVEDC's efforts to develop a revolving loan fund for small businesses.
- 28 CVEDC will be a subordinate lender. CVEDC is getting involved in Maker's spaces. The focus will 29 be on growing micro enterprises. The money CVEDC is using is from USDA Rural Development.
- 30 Central Vermont Chamber of Commerce – B. Moore discussed the Chamber's strategic planning effort. 31
 - The Chamber is also heavily involved in the discussion of a local options tax in Berlin.
