

Central Vermont Regional Plan

2008













- Purpose: to guide and coordinate change and development in the region.
- The Plan sets regional goals and policies, and provides a database with the intent of promoting the health, safety and general welfare.
- The 2016 Plan (Plan Central Vermont) will chart a course for the region through the year 2024.

CVRPC 2008 Regional Plan Assessment

Main Weaknesses:

Land Use (F), Implementation Program (D), Effectiveness in Act 250 & Section 248 Proceedings (D),

No documentation of planning process/public participation

CVRPC 2008 Regional Plan Assessment

CVRPC's 2008 plan's land use element contains general goals and policies such as:

"CVRPC endorses the concept of creating new villages to accommodate new growth,"

An example from the Rutland Region with slightly more specific policies:

Agricultural and silvicultural activities should continue to dominate the Region's low density areas. Development in low density areas should be unobtrusive and maintain the rural character and scale of the locale."

The Two Rivers-Ottauquechee Regional Plan has the most specific policies to guide development within each planning area:


"Principal retail establishments must be located in Town Centers, Designated Downtowns, or Designated Growth Centers to minimize the blighting effects of sprawl and strip development along major highways and maintain rural character."








Central Vermont: How much have we grown?

Central Vermont Regional Population, 1960-2010







Central Vermont: In What Industries Do We Work?




Largest Employment Sectors

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Regional Priorities Survey

- Purpose: Solicit broad public input on regional priorities for the different topic areas. Determine most relevant issues/topics of highest regional priority or concern.
- Development: Content based on 2008 goals, input from kick-off meeting and goals from other relevant plans.
- <u>Distribution</u>: Distributed online via web site, email, Facebook and FrontPorchForum. Incentives offered.
- Responses: 311 responses, 224 completed.

Regional Priorities Survey: Strong & Diverse Economy

- Goal 1: Preserve farms and forest lands by supporting the entire value-chain of the food system and natural resource economy. ... 41.4%
- Goal 2: Support redevelopment and infill to strengthen our downtowns, village and commercial districts... 41.4%
- Goal 3: Foster entrepreneurialism, support cottage industries and strengthen buy local efforts... 36.4%

Regional Priorities Survey: Transportation

- Goal 1: Integrate modes of travel in order to allow for their most effective use and ultimately reduce dependence on single occupant vehicles. ... 55.1%
- Goal 2: Promote a regional public transportation system. ... 50.2%
- Goal 3: Establish a transportation system that minimizes consumption of resources and maximizes the protection of the environment. ... 46.2%

Regional Priorities Survey: Future Land Use

- Coal 1: Sustain and support the region's working landscape of agriculture, including farming, forestry, fishing and sugaring... 57.1%
- Goal 2: Direct new growth in the form of jobs, housing, commerce, utilities, industry, community facilities, and cultural activities to downtowns and villages... 52.7%
- Goal 3: Support the adoption of clear land use plans and implementation policies that will preserve historic settlement patterns, and prevent rural sprawl... 37.5%
