PUBLIC HEARING: APPROVAL OF THE TOWN OF BERLIN MUNICIPAL PLAN AND CONFIRMATION OF THE LOCAL PLANNING PROCESS

R Krauth made a motion to open the hearing, seconded by J Ohlsson, all in favor. Motion carried.

Rock provided an overview of the Town Plan approval timeline which was included in the materials packet for the meeting, which included when staff informed the town the Plan didn't address all the state goals.

Dana Hanley thanked CVRPC and expressed the unfortunate series of events which have resulted in an adopted Town Plan which was found not to meet all the requirements (by CVRPC staff). The Town had taken much time and effort in the development of the plan and hired a planning consultant to write the plan. The Town was surprised to receive the letter from staff which outlines areas which it was found to not meet state requirements. It is the town goal to have an approved plan, as an unapproved plan is not acceptable. The town Selectboard did write a letter to CVRPC outlining changes it proposed to make to

the plan; they included some non-substantial changes now and some more changes in 2022. The town does not want to have go back to the voters to ask for them to approve the plan a second time in the near future.

Karla Nuissl, Chair of the Berlin PC stated that the town doesn't want to be in this positon. Nuissl is requesting approval of the plan and stated that the plan was written using the State Planning Manual as a guide. Nuissl handed out Page 20 of the planning manual, which directs town's to "strive to make plans as clear and concise..." and she re-iterated the 4 bullet points:

- Focus on achieving the vision the towns vision is for development and redevelopment of the mall area and the town center area
- Structure your plan around big ideas
- Utilize maps and graphics Committee members agreed the maps were great.
- Take out unnecessary information this was potentially a short coming of plan in respect to state planning goal 3 and 13

NuissI indicated that the town used this approach and believes the plan does meet the requirements as it incorporates the state planning goals by reference, while acknowledging they are not explicit. The town has made progress toward the goals as the zoning actually implements the goals and the proposed zoning make it easier to permit childcare facilities and educational facilities in more areas of town. The proposed zoning will make these facilities permitted and allowable in more zoning districts than the current zoning. (The town plans to adopt new zoning at town meeting)

Krauth indicated that the referenced manual presents some conflicting info as it wants plans to be shorter, but as outlined in Step 1 (from page 20) plans should use inventories of existing conditions in which to make future goals. There was no inventory (or mention) of childcare facilities or vocational education in the plan.

Discussion followed about making substantial progress toward the goals. Staff said that one way to measure this is by looking at the previous plan, Berlin's previous plan include more discussion about childcare. Discussion indicated that "substantial progress" is an undefined term and is hard to measure. Committee discussed how CVRPC has, should and could measure this. One way is to ask towns to report out on their progress – this is actually part of recent statutory changes and CVRPC should be asking towns to present this information along with the request to approve the plan. Krauth indicated that CVRPC should track the various ways which towns can demonstrate progress toward the goals and this could also help other towns.

Discussion continued about CVRPC process of reviewing plans, Wernecke cannot recall any plan which has not been approved since he has participated on the Commission.

Cattaneo voiced concern about measuring progress and the need to do so. Manchester suggested the Town should be looking at number of facilities and the number of open slots for childcare facilities and raised the question of vocational education. Nuissl responded that the education was lumped together and that the proposed zoning does make allowances for both regular educational facilities and vocational facilities.

Participant's agreed that CVRPC should use stronger language when giving towns comments on PC draft Town Plans to ensure the town understand the plan requirements and what is need to approval by the RPC.

L Cattaneo, made a motion to close the hearing, seconded by J Manchester, all in favor. Motion carried.

Manchester made a motion to provisionally recommend approval of the Berlin Town Plan provided the Town submit base line data on Goal 3 (vocational facilities) and Goal 13 (childcare) to CVRPC by the close of business on October 9, 2018, seconded by L Cattaneo, all in favor. Motion carried.

The committee recognizes the town paid a consultant and provided meeting space to the PC.

J Ohlsson made a motion to recommend confirmation of Berlin's planning process, seconded by Cattaneo, all in favor. Motion carried.

The committee suggests the town should demonstrate progress before the end of the plan cycle (8 years).

Manchester made a motion to recommend a letter be sent to the town asking the town to document its progress toward the goals prior to 2022, seconded by Krauth, all in favor. Motion carried.

RULES OF PROCEDURE & COMMITTEE PROCESS

Rock provided an update on the status of the Rule of Procedure, they will need to be formally adopted by the Commission. Waninger added that there is no longer an energy committee as Cattaneo had asked if an energy committee could review the energy plans for certification. Waninger also added that the energy plans have a separate checklist that staff will have to fill out in order to determine is an energy plan meets the new requirements. Staff will modify new wording for a new bullet which states "make a recommendation regarding certification of an energy plan..." and shall present it to the committee for review.
