Rock advised that this is a brainstorming session to share 21 ideas so the RPC can document and address during the amendment process. 22 23 a) Municipal Needs, Challenges, and Successes Roundtable 24 25 The Board proceeded with an exercise of writing down and then sharing experiences they are seeing in 26 their municipalities.

## Example of successes:

- 4 Duxbury grant to look at erosion projects throughout the town which was narrowed to most pertinent.
- 5 <u>East Montpelier</u> putting in place a capital plan and budget process
- 6 Waterbury 3 affordable housing projects as well as new section 8 housing
- 7 Protection of wildlife corridor (also a challenge)
- 8 <u>Berlin</u> Town Center designation grant awarded
- 9 Water system improvements
- 10 Roxbury the school merger has worked well for residents and is encouraging growth
- 11 <u>Woodbury</u> proactive with MRGP in the past which has resulted in having their roads in good shape
- 12 Alleviation of some of the flooding issues in village
- Waitsfield well organized with MRVPD to help with their issues
- 14 Moretown village sidewalks are to be installed this year were able to leverage stormwater funding
- due to infrastructure needs for the sidewalks
- 16 Repaying of village and bridge replacement also planned for this summer
- 17 Large tracts of forested land going on the market at the same time which creates opportunities for
- 18 utilization with regard to conservation land donation was made to the town
- 19 Vitality in recreation committees and trail planning
- 20 <u>Plainfield</u> dedicated grant writer that's gotten sidewalks, kiosks, etc.
- 21 Willingness for volunteer service
- 22 <u>Williamstown</u> renewable energy and solar farm growth
- 23 LHMP process with RPC which opened up emergency services conversations in the town
- 24 Grant for EAB (WNRCD) mitigation (inventory and management plan)
- 25 Montpelier downtown development zone and new growth
- 26 Involvement of Montpelier Alive
- 27 Orange Brook Road and Reservoir Road to be reclassified to be a connector between 302 and 2 (along
- with Plainfield)
- 29 <u>Barre City</u> does a good job with small staff budget just passed
- Worcester recent survey showed they are on target in reserving natural aspects of the town very few
- 31 houses and jobs added, but that is how community wants it

- 36 <u>East Montpelier</u> Inadequate village water supply and no village wastewater system

- 34 Cabot age in place and keep you here
- 35 Squeezing out of small farms and homesteads
- 36 Affordability (fix what is holding towns back in the regional plan)
- 37 Barre Town decommissioning (i.e. solar panels)
- 38 Plainfield old housing stock in the village
- 39 Development in the village vs. other areas in town
- 40 Volume and impact of vehicular traffic on Route 2
- 41 Williamstown Downtown business development
- 42 Increased ATV traffic and using town roads to connect trails to enhance business development

- 11 Transportation opportunities Route 302 through City but doesn't get people to stop and take
- 12 advantage of the city
- 13 Affordable housing lots of housing stock but not lots of great quality
- 14 Lot of homelessness and poverty needs appropriate measures
- 15 Flood resiliency and the rules and regulations related to that
- 16 Changes to housing board of review
- 17 No grocery store in the downtown
- 18 Climate change and dependency on fossil fuels and impact on reaching 2050 goal
- 19 <u>Worcester</u> climate change
- 20 No zoning
- 21 Important to protect unfragmented forest blocks
- 22 Preserving agricultural land for agriculture
- 23 Finalizing Town Plan and alternative energy plan
