Quorum was 13 present. 14 15 **Adjustments to the Agenda** 16 None. 17 **Public Comments** 18 19 None. 20 21 2021 VELCO Long Range Transmission Plan 22 Hill-Eubanks directed the Board to the information in the packet and introduced participants from 23 VELCO. Hantz Presume provided detail on the presentation shared in the packet regarding VELCO's 24 Long Term Transmission Plan for Vermont. Highlighted were summer and winter peak loads, load 25 forecast scenarios, information on solar PV growth, the impact of electric vehicles and heat pumps up

future load, load control, upgrade projections, and the need to optimize distribution geographically. It was emphasized that storage or load management is necessary to avoid future transmission problems and that better communication between all stakeholders is essential.

When the floor was opened to questions it was confirmed that while Vermont's peak used to be in the summer, the peak in the future is projected to be in the winter due to heat pumps and electric vehicles. Presume advised he was not able to speak to the effect the New England clean energy corridor would have on rates in the future.

When asked what the RPC should be doing to help manage what VELCO is trying to do; the following was recommended: have developers install storage as part of their projects and ask developers to allow control of their inverters on their projects to allow better communication; consider different types of technology other than solar PV which has a low capacity factor, noting a mixing of technologies will reduce the generation needed on a system.

When asked about the need for integrated planning between distribution and transmission sides, Presume confirmed there needed to be better collaboration between VELCO, distribution utilities, Dept. of Public Service, RPCs, and other organizations doing the planning for facilities. He also confirmed that there is still work that needs to be done on storage. While utilities are working on this more work is necessary and consideration should be given to planning for the provision of incentives for developers to install storage as part of their projects. He also confirmed that electric vehicles will aggravate storage problems and that utilities offering incentives not to charge during peak usage times (with technology to support) would be helpful.

There was question as to whether VELCO could provide information on storage and other problems related to load to legislators and others. Presume advised they have testified several times at the Legislature regarding transmission systems, storage and solar PV, as have the utilities. He noted that many organizations are trying to provide the necessary information to lawmakers to help them make the right decisions for Vermont.

Clarification was also requested regarding findings on the capacity into the future and how it relates to energy targets outlined in regional plans. Presume confirmed that some regions have listed targets that are lower than what the current system can accommodate. He noted he was not saying regions cannot achieve their targets, but that systems as they currently are cannot accommodate the large numbers. He indicated that storage to absorb excess energy, manage load, curtail generation that is controllable by operators, or reinforcing the system to allow meeting these targets is necessary and that communication is needed on how to bridge the gap.

There was also discussion on the fees charged by utilities to solar customers and the need to maintain the proper infrastructure that would be necessary should there be an event that interrupts solar generation for a period of time. He noted he anticipates there will continue to be monthly fees to all solar consumers in order to maintain the grid to ensure it is always there.

35	Hill-Eubanks thanked the Nominating Committee for their work and opened the floor to nominations for
36	each role outlined above. No additional nominations from the floor were offered and nominations were
37	subsequently closed. She advised that staff will mail a ballot to all Commissioners by Friday and that
38	ballots will need to be received at CVRPC by June 4 th .

40	There was confirmation that members elected to committees will begin their duties starting July 1 st .
41	
42	Municipal Updates
43	Brabant shared information on a chronic local issue in their town and also seen in neighboring towns
44	which is that of domesticated livestock getting loose. He noted towns have limited ability under statute

to address the problem. He advised that there was legislation introduced by Janet Ancel which passed the House, but is currently sitting in the Senate. He inquired if anyone wants to join the bandwagon to implore legislature to address this issue when owners aren't addressing the problem.

Emery shared that Plainfield is having issues with fireworks and many fire department chiefs are joining together to lobby legislature about the issue. She also noted the Town needs to replace a bridge in the village and are working on planning and funding for that, and they are also dealing with hurdles related to a pedestrian walkway over the Winooski River.

Waninger shared a celebration regarding Middlesex receiving two awards from VPA: Plan of the Year for Walkable Middlesex Village Study and their Planning Commission won Citizen Planners of the Year.

Carbee advised that Washington is beginning discussions on use of forthcoming COVID funds and inquired what other municipalities are planning. Waterbury is doing a water main extension project, Woodbury is considering high speed internet connectivity project with CV Fiber and potentially restoring the Town Hall to create meeting space to comply with COVID restrictions. Berlin is discussing culvert repair on Fisher Road, and a bridge project on another road in town, Waninger advised she has heard larger municipalities are doing water/wastewater infrastructure, broadband, lost revenues. She reminded members that transportation is not an eligible use (but can shift funds other places in order to make room for transportation projects). She noted that the US Treasury released Guidance and Fact Sheet on Monday, which will be forwarded to members and municipalities. She also reminded members that municipalities will need a DUNS number if they don't already have one. Funds are anticipated as soon as July and will come directly from the State. She also noted VLCT advises municipalities to put funds in a separate account from their General Fund for more consistent tracking and easier auditing. She suggested all towns should think of 10 projects and then confirm whether or not they are eligible. VLCT and RPCs will work cooperatively with towns to assist (VLCT – Risk Management, Legal, Education) (RPCs – meet with towns, project ideas, etc.).

Meeting Minutes – April 13, 2021

Hill-Eubanks directed the Board to the information in the packet.

L. Catteneo moved to approve the minutes; D. La Haye seconded. Motion carried.

Reports

Hill-Eubanks directed the Board to the information in the packet noting that included was an interesting summary from the Vermont Commission on Women with details about impacts from the COVID-19 Crisis on Vermont Women.

Potter questioned where staff and committee reports were and inquired if they would be posted. It was confirmed they will be posted.

Hill-Eubanks advised the Board that Potter will be retiring from the RPC this month and thanked her for all her work alongside Waninger to improve the RPC. She noted it had been Potter's mission to put in place new policies and procedures to help us all be more efficient and effective at the RPC. She was an excellent chair and helped make the job a lot easier with all her knowledge. She stated she hoped her

next projects bring her immense joy and satisfaction. Potter advised it was a pleasure working with everyone and help the RPC live up to all of its potential. Others shared their gratitude for Potter's work.
