5 Chair Steve Lotspeich called the meeting to order at 6:35 pm.

6 **Roll Call**

 - Roll was called and a quorum was present

8 **Adjustments to the Agenda**

1 **New Staff Introductions**

- 2 • Sam Lash, the CVRPC Climate and Energy Planner, introduced herself to the committee.
3 Sam will provide assistance for addressing climate change and Vermont’s clean energy
4 goals.

5 **Review of Draft November Meeting Minutes**

- 6 • Steve Lotspeich asked that several small corrections be made to the minutes for October
7 and January. Staff updated the minutes. Richard Turner *moved that the minutes from*
8 *January 25, 2022 be accepted as revised.* Don LaHaye seconded the motion. The motion
9 passed unanimously. Robert Wernecke *moved that the minutes from October, 21 2021 be*
10 *accepted as revised.* Joyce Manchester seconded the motion. The Motion passed
11 unanimously.

12 **Transportation demand management**

- 13 • Staff gave a little background on transportation demand management, and how it is the
14 process of providing a greater diversity of choice to all users of transportation
15 infrastructure to provide greater flexibility to all users while reducing congestion and
16 emissions. Staff continued that under the TPI work plan, staff are encouraged to
17 complete a certain number of activities to support state goals. In the past this work has
18 followed VTrans guidance. Staff wanted to open the subject to the greater TAC to explore
19 opportunities for to broaden this work.
- 20 • Committee members shared their past experiences with TDM, focusing on how the work
21 has often revolved around teaming up with larger employers to created ride share
22 opportunities or encouraging the use of the Park and Ride lots.
- 23 • Robert Wernecke then pointed out that the pandemic has really brought remote working
24 and meetings to the forefront as a viable alternative to driving, but the infrastructure is
25 still lagging to provide equal service in remote areas where low bandwidth can be a
26 restricting factor. Robert Wernecke continued that we also need to work on how we use
27 the technologies at hand, as he has been in some meetings where the message is failing
28 to be transmitted to the participants because of poor audio or other technical factors.
29 Further musing on how can we improve on this process? Bob Atchinson voiced support
30 for these points further underlining the need for the infrastructure in rural communities.
31 Karin McNeill further questioned how the region perhaps could support improved hybrid
32 meeting formats.
- 33 • Joyce Manchester brought up the generous subsidies that the state offers its employees
34 for ride sharing or for using transit, adding that it might be a good idea to advertise those
35 programs again once the impact of Covid begins to recede. Joyce Manchester then
36 shifted the conversation to funding a regional level electric vehicle car sharing program,
37 perhaps with grants, similar to the Local Motion E-bike Library. Karin McNeill brought up

1 the Hitching Post concept that was getting underway in 2019 to encourage ride sharing.
2 Based on a post with flags placed adjacent to the road at local hubs, individuals could flag
3 a ride from a rural community into Montpelier and back again. Karin McNeill wondered
4 how this could be reactivated.

- 5 • Karin McNeill then wondered what role cyclist safety improvements, particularly at rural
6 intersections, could play in making biking a more attractive alternative to driving.
- 7 • Bob Atchinson asked about the MyRide ride hailing program in Montpelier and Berlin and
8 staff gave a brief report on the current status of service and some its strengths,
9 weaknesses and how it is being tweaked to improve service.

10 **TAC Member Round Table**

- 11 • Staff gave some updates and reminders on the Municipal Road General Permit, the
12 forthcoming state solicitation for bridge projects, and the TPI planning study solicitation
13 that will continue until March 8.
- 14 • Richard Turner reported that the new Park and Ride lot in Williamstown has been really
15 well received. Discussions continued on Park and Ride Lots, touching on the new design
16 of the Berlin lot.

17 **Adjourn**

- 18 • Robert Wernecke made the motion, seconded by Don LaHaye, *to adjourn*. By unanimous
19 consent, the motion carried.
