Re: EPA Brownfields Grant - Revolving Loan Fund

ACTION REQUESTED: For the purposes of establishing an EPA Brownfields Revolving Loan Fund, the Central Vermont Regional Planning Commission Board of Commissioners moves to adopt Resolution 2025-02 - Establishment of Brownfields Revolving Loan Fund

Background:

On May 16, 2025, Central Vermont Regional Planning Commission (CVRPC) was awarded \$1,000,000 to fund a Brownfield Revolving Loan Fund (RLF). Eligible areas under this award are Washington and Orange counties. In order to utilize these funds CVRPC will be required to establish a Revolving Loan Fund. According to CVRPC Bylaws Section 704: Borrowing Authority, CVRPC may borrow money and incur indebtedness for the purposes of purchasing or leasing property for office space, establish and administer a revolving loan fund, or establish a line of credit, if approved by a two-thirds vote of the Board. Any obligation by CVRPC incurred under this section shall comply with the requirements set forth at 24 V.S.A. Section 4345(16)(B)(i)-(ii).

Scope of Work:

Program oversight:

CVRPC will perform loan management services to support implementation of the RLF Program, including developing an administrative plan detailing all policies and procedures relevant to establishing and administering the Brownfields RLF Program.

Loan underwriting:

CVRPC intends to procure the services of a loan underwriter to manage loans and associated financial record keeping, reporting, and provide reports monthly at Brownfields Advisory Committee meetings.

Public engagement:

To advance public understanding and awareness of the program, CVRPC will conduct community engagement through its brownfields committee and through direct outreach to communities and businesses.

Project oversite:

CVRPC has procured the services of a third-party qualified environmental (QEP) consulting firm, Montrose Environmental, to prepare eligibility requests for EPA approval and review or create required plans and documentation, review remediation plans, and abatement plans to verify cleanups will be completed in a manner protective of public health and the environment, and in accordance with applicable Vermont regulations. The QEP will also confirm each applicant's enrollment in required state programs, perform site visits while cleanups are in progress, and review remedial documentation (or other reports) to confirm cleanup was completed in accordance with plans, and applicable State, federal, local, and loan/subgrant requirements.

CVRPC staff will work closely with Montrose Environmental to establish and set up the administration of the revolving loan fund. Montrose has a staff person, Derek Street, with expertise in EPA-specific revolving loan fund administration. Representatives from Montrose will attend the June meeting virtually to introduce themselves and take any questions that Commissioners may still have.

Follow-up

At the December 10, 2024, Board of Commissioners meeting staff led a discussion on the application with the Board of Commissioners. At that time the following questions were asked:

Question: Are the only funds required to establish the RLF coming from the EPA or are we required to find additional sources of funding to set it up?

Response: CVRPC will not contribute any additional funding to the RLF. The grant also includes administrative drawdown to support staff administrative time and the consulting services of the QEP, attorney, and loan underwriter.

Question: Would this enable CVRPC to fund remediation projects?

Response: Yes.

Question: Would CVRPC be managing loans, or would it partner with a bank?

Response: CVRPC intends to partner with an underwriter.

Question: What expertise and staff time is needed, including how much staff time required?

Response: Technical work will be completed through consulting services procured through the QEP, attorney, and a loan underwriter. An administrative drawdown is provided for staff time. Further, CVRPC staff will attend trainings and annual conferences with the EPA Brownfields Program as a resource to support the operation and growth of the program.

Question: Is CVRPC and staff ready and qualified to take on this responsibility?

Response: Eli Toohey has successfully managed our existing brownfields program since joining CVRPC two years ago. During this time, she has re-energized the CVRPC Brownfields Committee and grown our assessment program significantly with limited state funding resources. Further she will have the expertise and technical assistance of third party procured services.

Many of CVRPC's peer RPCs are operating RLFs with smaller or similar sized and experienced teams. Having interviewed several other RPC directors on their experience operating an RLF, it is the CVRPC Executive Director's opinion that CVRPC is qualified to successfully take on the responsibility and meet this demonstrated need in the Central Vermont planning area.



Resolution 2025-02 Establishment of Brownfields Revolving Loan Fund

WHEREAS, the Central Vermont Regional Planning Commission ("CVRPC") has been awarded \$1,000,000 under the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's Fiscal Year 2025 Individual Revolving Loan Fund (RLF) Program for the purpose of supporting brownfield cleanup and redevelopment projects through loans and subgrants; and

WHEREAS, 24 V.S.A. § 4345(16)(B) authorizes regional planning commissions to borrow money and incur indebtedness for the purposes of purchasing or leasing property for office space, establishing and administering a revolving loan fund, or establishing a line of credit; and

- i. No obligation incurred under this subdivision shall encumber the grand list or any property of a member municipality; and
- ii. In the case of a purchase, any collateral pledged shall be limited to the property being purchased and shall not exceed the fair market value of that property; and

WHEREAS, Section 704 of the CVRPC Bylaws likewise authorizes CVRPC to borrow money and incur indebtedness for the purposes described in the statute, including establishing and administering a revolving loan fund, if approved by a two-thirds vote of the Board;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Commissioners of the Central Vermont Regional Planning Commission that:

- 1. CVRPC is hereby authorized to establish and administer a Revolving Loan Fund (RLF) using the \$1,000,000 awarded by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency under the FY25 RLF Program.
- 2. Any obligation by CVRPC shall comply with the requirements set forth in 24 V.S.A. Section 4345(16)(B)(i)-(ii).

Adopted by a two-thirds vote of the Board of Commissioners at a duly warned meeting of the CVRPC Board on the 10^{th} day of June, 2025.

Call to Order: Chair D'Amico called the meeting to order at 6:31 pm, a roll call was completed, and a quorum was present.

Adjustments to the Agenda: FY25 should read FY26 for Nominations item on agenda.

Public Comments: None

Legislative Update: Chair D'Amico introduced Josh Hanford of the Vermont League of Cities & Towns (VLCT). Josh provided an overview of VLCT's 2025 legislative priorities which include: lower property taxes, invest locally, improve accountability, create housing, promote public safety, and build resilient communities. For this discussion he focused the legislation being closely followed by VLCT, specifically related to housing and infrastructure - Community Housing Investment Program (CHIP). Also discussed were the open meeting law reform bill, flood bill, 3-acre reform bill, as well as the education reform bill. There was discussion and questions related to open meeting law, the CHIP application process, multi-use development, wastewater extensions, flood mitigation and reimbursement, and infrastructure funding (video of this presentation is available on CVRPC website).

Following this presentation, Will Pitkin provided an overview for the Board of the legislative update memorandum that was included in the packet, which also outlined specifically those legislative items that will have potential impact on our commission and municipalities.

FY26 Nominations: Chair D'Amico introduced Alice Peal, Chair of the Nominating Committee, who provided an overview of the recommended slate of officers and committee appointments as outlined in the meeting packet. The floor was opened to additional nominations from the floor for each committee. David Stapleton was nominated by Peter Carbee for one of the vacant alternate seats on the Basin Water Quality Council, and he accepted the nomination.

Doug Greason moved to accept the recommended slate as proposed by the Nominating Committee with the additional nomination from the floor; seconded by Royal DeLegge. Motion passed unanimously.

It was noted that a ballot of the slate as accepted will be mailed to Commissioners within five days.

Minutes - (4/08/25):

Peter Carbee moved to accept the minutes as written; seconded by David Stapleton. Motion passed unanimously.

Reports:

Eli Toohey shared details about the upcoming Housing Workshop and Roundtable scheduled for May 21st.

Peter Carbee moved to accept the Staff and Committee reports, seconded by Robert Wernecke. Motion passed unanimously.

Commissioner Round Table:

Alice Peal thanked Eli for all of her work on the Regional Plan Committee as it relates to housing. Will Pitkin queried the Board as to whether they want direct emails of Project Review Committee comments when they are sent; or if they would like them provided in the monthly board packet. After discussion it was determined the preference was direct emails.

Adjournment: Peter Carbee moved to adjourn to 7:49 pm; seconded by Alice Peal. Motion passed unanimously.

Re: Review of Proposed Telecommunications Tower in Washington, VT

During review of advance notice filings <u>25-0703-AN</u>, the Central Vermont Regional Planning Commission's (CVRPC) Project Review Committee noted the following concerns with the proposed telecommunications tower at 97 Hart Hollow Road in Washington, VT.

Many of these concerns were raised previously in the committee's memo dated December 6, 2024 in relation to the prior advance notice filing for this proposal, 24-3108-AN. In response to that prior letter, the applicants' attorneys stated that the committee's concerns would be addressed at a public meeting in Washington; however, the committee did not find that the concerns were sufficiently addressed at the February 11, 2025 public meeting, nor in the new advance notice filing 25-0703-AN. Furthermore, the committee found that Washington residents raised additional concerns at the public meeting that the applicant has not sufficiently addressed.

The CVRPC Project Review Committee hopes to receive further information to address these concerns in future filings before the Public Utility Commission and reserves the right to intervene in the Section 248a petition proceeding.

In reviewing the filings 25-0703-AN, the CVRPC Project Review Committee noted the following areas of concern:

- How has the applicant addressed potential for colocation with existing towers
- The proposed project is sited in a groundwater source protection area and proposes using a diesel-fueled backup generator with onsite diesel fuel storage
- What would be the aesthetic impacts on Washington's historic village
- How has the project incorporated historic preservation concerns

Potential for colocation with existing towers

At the Washington public meeting, Washington residents stated that there had previously been Verizon service in parts of the town – CVRPC requests further information about this history to determine the potential for colocation with existing towers, as detailed below.

At the public meeting, numerous Washington residents stated that they had Verizon service in Washington until several years ago, when one day service suddenly ceased. The applicants' representatives at the meeting did not explain why Verizon's cell service suddenly ceased and, instead, speculated that service may have diminished gradually over time due to various factors. Washington residents stated that this did not match their experience, which was that service ceased suddenly, not gradually, for numerous residents on the same day. Understanding this history of why Verizon provided cell service then suddenly ceased service – and from what tower(s) – is critical to understanding the potential for colocation on existing towers.

The applicants provided some but not enough information about the potential for colocation, specifically they provided a list of existing nearby towers, maps comparing service area if the proposed tower were built vs. current service area with no new tower and no colocation, and the assertion that no existing towers could provide the same level of service to Washington as the proposed new tower next to Washington's historic village.

This information is insufficient to determine the potential for colocation for the following reasons: 1) there was no comparison of service areas if the proposed tower were built vs. if the applicants colocated their equipment on existing tower(s), especially any tower(s) on which the applicants or their affiliates may have previously colocated equipment, and 2) stating that no other towers could provide the same level of service to Washington as the proposed tower next to the village avoids the question of whether an adequate level of service could be provided by colocating equipment on existing tower(s). Undoubtedly, a new tower right next to Washington's population center would provide better service to more residents, but many residents at the public meeting stated that they found Verizon service in Washington before it ceased several years ago to be adequate (an imprecise metric but a reasonable benchmark for comparison). The applicants' proposed tower near Washington's historic village has faced significant opposition from Washington residents for reasons including aesthetic impacts and impacts to the character of the historic village center. If colocating equipment on existing tower(s) could provide adequate service to Washington without building an unpopular new tower, that information is necessary to determine the potential for colocation.

CVRPC requests that the applicants state:

- What tower(s) Verizon and its affiliates previously used to provide cell service to parts of Washington
- Why they stopped using the aforementioned tower(s)
- Why they allegedly cannot use the aforementioned tower(s) to provide service going forward instead of building a new tower

CVRPC also requests that the applicants provide maps that compare coverage from the proposed tower vs. coverage if they colocated their equipment on the closest existing tower(s), especially on tower(s) that they or their affiliates previously used.

Risk of Groundwater Contamination

In its December 6, 2024 memo, the CVRPC Project Review Committee suggested using a propane-fueled backup generator instead of a diesel-fueled backup generator in order to reduce the risk of groundwater contamination, since the proposed new tower is sited in a mapped groundwater source protection area. Although this would be an easy and effective solution to reduce the risk of groundwater contamination, the applicants still proposed using a diesel-fueled backup generator in the newest advance notice filing; the only change from the previous filing (24-3108-AN) to the newest one (25-0703-AN) is that the applicants provided more information on the proposed spill retention measures, which meet but do not exceed minimum state requirements.

CVRPC reiterates its request that the applicants use a propane-fueled backup generator to reduce the risk of groundwater contamination. If the applicants continue to propose a diesel-fueled backup generator in the mapped groundwater source protection area, CVRPC requests an explanation of why the applicants cannot use a propane-fueled backup generator instead.

Please find below a preliminary list of clauses in the 2024 Central Vermont Regional Plan that relate to the concerns raised. The CVRPC Project Review Committee will consider these and others while reviewing the project application for conformance with the Regional Plan.

Potential for colocation with existing towers:

"Policies:

- 2. Telecommunication facilities should be sited, designed, maintained and operated so as to minimize negative impacts on natural, cultural and scenic resources. Use of stealth design and/or use of existing structures are encouraged where appropriate. New towers should be no taller than necessary to provide coverage. The policies of this Plan addressing ridgeline and hilltop development (see Land Use Element, Goal 5) are intended to apply to telecommunication facilities.
- 3. Use of existing towers, communication facilities, and structures where possible, is encouraged and expected rather than development of new transmission and receiving stations. Permits for tower facilities should require permittees to accommodate additional users, appropriate to the structure, at a fair market rate." (Utilities, Facilities, & Services 5-55)

Siting in a groundwater source protection area:

"The preservation of ecologically sensitive places is a goal of this Plan.... Resource protection lands include: protected lands, wildlife habitat, high elevation areas, steep slopes, critical resource areas, groundwater recharge areas, surface waters, wetlands, floodplains and scenic areas." (Land Use 2-6, 2-7)

"It is critical, therefore, that our existing and future groundwater supplies are protected. The future of our municipalities and their prospects for new growth and development depend upon the quality and quantity of this important resource." (Land Use 2-10)

Aesthetic impacts on Washington's village:

"Goal 5: To preserve the aesthetic quality of the Region" (Land Use 2-41)

"The location of telecommunication towers is a significant aesthetic issue within the Region." (Land Use 2-42)

"While Central Vermonters want and expect good cellular service, they also expect the placement and design of new facilities to be guided by a respect for the integrity of the Region's landscape and compliance with microwave emissions standards. As such, it is important to balance aesthetics, signal quality, health, business and personal needs when deciding whether and where to build new towers and other facilities." (Utilities, Facilities, & Services 5-27)

"Policies:

1. Telecommunication facilities should not be sited where they may create an attractive nuisance. 2. Telecommunication facilities should be sited, designed, maintained and operated so as to minimize negative impacts on natural, cultural and scenic resources. Use of stealth design and/or use of existing structures are encouraged where appropriate. New towers should be no taller than necessary to provide coverage. The policies of this

Plan addressing ridgeline and hilltop development (see Land Use Element, Goal 5) are intended to apply to telecommunication facilities."

3. Use of existing towers, communication facilities, and structures where possible, is encouraged and expected rather than development of new transmission and receiving stations. Permits for tower facilities should require permittees to accommodate additional users, appropriate to the structure, at a fair market rate." (Utilities, Facilities, & Services 5-55)

Historic preservation:

"CVRPC encourages planning that identifies, respects and preserves our important historic, natural, cultural, and recreational resources." (Introduction 1-7)

"Significant properties and historic resources edify and provide important benefits to individuals, municipalities, and the Region in the forms of aesthetics enhancement, economic revitalization, tourism, job creation and investment tax credits. Central Vermont harbors a rich historic record, in its buildings, in its soil, and in the very fabric of its landscape. It is a goal of this Region to preserve, protect, and perpetuate this record as an important part of Vermont's heritage." (Utilities, Facilities, & Services 5-47)
